

Coordinator's Message

Success! The SWAP pre-convention Institute on Women and Psychology will be held in Halifax on Wednesday June 5th. The Institute Coordinators, Meryl Cook and June Fukushima, have been working hard to organize a stimulating and fun day. I hope all of you coming to the Maritimes for the CPA convention will arrange to come a day early to attend the Institute.

The SWAP program on Saturday afternoon of the convention also looks exciting. In recognition of the UN International Year of Youth, four panelists will look at young women's experiences in a symposium entitled "Young Women: Present Realities and Future Possibilities." The presentations are as follows: Frances Newman, "Aspects of female development: Ego and identity"; Cheryl Malmo, "Compulsive eating, body image and femininity"; Margaret Schneider, "The young lesbian coming out: Counselling issues"; and Meredith Kimball, "Effort attributions and sex-role conflicts as factors in young women's math choices: The problems with hard work in a male domain."

In organizing the SWAP Business Meeting, I need your assistance. There are, of course, a number of regular business items to be attended to. And if all continues to go well Wendy Josephson will be able to announce the winner of the SWAP Student Paper Award and Rhona Steinberg will announce the recipients of the Travel Bursaries. In addition, I am very interested in knowing what you would like to see on the agenda. What would you like to discuss? What should SWAP be doing? What could we do to make it an even more vital and active section? Please drop me a note with any agenda items you have in mind. Meanwhile, let me share some of the thoughts I have had so that you can be thinking about them before the meeting.

(1) Terms of office. Currently the Coordinator is on the Executive for three years (one as Coordinator-Elect, one as Coordinator, and one as Past-Coordinator) while the Secretary-Treasurer serves for only one year, and the Newsletter Editor(s) have indeterminate terms. Last year Monique Lussier suggested that the Secretary/Treasurer serve a two-year term to maximize the use of talents and to minimize turnover. We did not have time to discuss this at the Ottawa meeting but I plan to put it on the agenda for this year's meeting. I hope you will be thinking about your reactions to this proposal. And what about the Newsletter Editor(s)? My own view is that their term of office should be at least two years but this should be discussed as well.

(2) Provincial representatives. Right now we have no specific mechanism for selecting provincial reps, no term of office, and no clear responsibilities. I hope you will have some thoughts on this issue as well.

(3) Directory of feminist therapists. This was Cheryl Malmo's suggestion. Would you like to see SWAP pursue this? If so, how?

(4) Institute. Should we try to make this an annual event? Bi-annual? Do you want to plan one for next year? If so, what suggestions do you have for a theme?

(5) A birthday party. Next year SWAP (nee IGWAP) will be ten years old! How about a gala birthday party?

I hope to see you in Halifax -- at the Institute, the Saturday afternoon SWAP program, and the Business Meeting. Meanwhile, we can celebrate the fact that the equity clause in the Constitution takes effect this month and winter will come to an end.

Athabasca University Women's Studies Opens

Athabasca University provides correspondence courses for students across Canada. It was established so that adult Canadians can earn a university education no matter where they live or work, or what other commitments they have to jobs or families. The university's open admissions policy, flexible registration dates and study schedules, and distance education methods provide an alternative for adults seeking university education. Students may earn a degree from Athabasca or may be able to transfer credits to or from a program at another university. The only admission requirements are that a student be 18 years of age or older and a resident of Canada.

Athabasca's new Women's Studies Program goes into operation in September, 1985. The following three courses will be available at that time:

1. Womens Studies 267: Perspectives on Women: An Introduction to Women's Studies.
2. History 325: The History of Women in North America, 1830 to the Present.
3. Psychology 343: Issues and Strategies in Counselling Girls and Women.

The latter course is written from a feminist perspective by Cheryl Malmo. If you know of students or community workers (from sexual assault centers, battered women's shelter's, social services agencies, etc.) who would have use for such a course, please pass along this information. Message From NAC

An Urgent Message Concerning Indian Women

from: Madeleine Parent, Chairperson, NAC Native Women's Committee

The federal Cabinet is studying a Government bill aimed at removing discrimination against Indian women who lost Indian Status because of a discriminatory Indian Act, adopted by a white man's Parliament in 1869. The intent of the Act was that Indians should be assimilated.

Section 12(1)(b) of that Act took away Indian status from an Indian woman who married a non-Indian. Her children then had no Indian status. However, an Indian man who married a non-Indian woman kept his status and conferred it on his wife and children.

Since its founding days, NAC has supported the cause of these Indian women. After years of promises by all parties, a P.C. Government bill on this issue is before Cabinet, and from there, to be processed through Parliament.

We are concerned that there may be important inadequacies in the bill and we are concerned about what will happen to it in Parliament.

WE NEED YOUR HELP

Please send telegrams, letters, or make phone calls or visits to Government ministers, to MPs or to Senators. It would help if you contacted the following:

Ministers from your region; and also : Rt. Hon. J. Turner, Opposition Leader; E. Broadbent, NDP Leader and your own MP, these to be sent to the House of Commons and the Senate.

SUGGESTED TEXT FOR A MESSAGE TO A GOVERNMENT MINISTER, AN M.P. OR A SENATOR:

A Government bill, aimed at removing discrimination against Indian women who lost Indian status through marriage to a non-Indian, is being processed through Cabinet.

We are concerned that this bill should reinstate these Indian women into their equality rights as human beings. We therefore urge you to take a stand for repeal of the discriminatory section 12(1)(b) of the Indian Act and for reinstatement, retroactively, of these women and their children to active membership in their band.

Note: "Active membership in the band" does not give an automatic right to residency on the band reserve. Procedures to reside in the band reserve may be determined by the band, provided a fair appeal procedure is legislated.

The key sentence in the message to parliamentarians is the underlined sentence.

No postage is needed for letters to M.Ps. if sent to Parliament while it is in session.

Support Needed For Equal Rights Programs

Last summer a letter-writing campaign began to Ottawa OPPOSING EQUAL RIGHTS FOR WOMEN. This campaign is ANTI-EQUAL PAY FOR WORK OF EQUAL VALUE, ANTI-CHOICE, ANTI-CONTRACEPTION, ANTI-FUNDS for work to improve the status of women. This campaign is extremely well-organized and well-funded. In the weeks before Christmas, the Prime Minister received THREE MILLION TELEGRAMS opposing freedom of choice. The Secretary of State Women' Programme, which funds 600 feminist organizations, was criticized in MORE THAN DOUBLE that number of letters.

Herizons, Hysteria, and Kinesis have been targeted for attack, as have the Women's Programme, Studio D -- the women's branch of the National Film Board -- the Canadian Council of Learning Opportunities for Women and the National Action Committee. In addition to the periodicals mentioned above, the feminist press across the country has been targeted for destruction.

The issue has come up in the House of Commons and the Federal Cabinet. The Prime Minister and the Secretary of State have received millions of letters opposing sex equality; as of late February they had NOT RECEIVED ONE SUPPORTING IT. The other side has done their homework. We have not. If we are to keep the gains we've made, if we're to keep from losing what we've gained and the funds to continue our work, we must provide many many letters, starting now and from now on.

Suggested wording for a PRELIMINARY letter is below. Since letters are counted (and, rumour has it, weighed -- government by the pound), one person should write one letter.

End Discrimination Against Female Seniors

The Canadian government has announced that it hopes to extend the Spouse's Allowance (an element of the old-age security program) to single people in need between the ages of 60 and 64. Unfortunately, the only people eligible are widows and widowers, which constitutes discrimination against the 80,000 Canadians in this age bracket who are single, separated, or divorced. Of these 80,000 a great majority are women. Jean'Claude Malépart (parliamentary delegate to the LPC'S committee on senior citizens) would appreciate hearing your views on this issue. His address is 416 Confederation Bldg., House of Commons.
