As a Co-Lead in the Southern Network of Specialized Care, RSA offers inter-disciplinary clinical and specialized services informed by expertise within Behavioural Consultation, Case Management, Psychology, Psychiatry, Primary Health Care, Speech and Language Pathology, Occupational Therapy, Social Work and trauma informed care for people with intellectual disabilities across the Southwest Region of Ontario. RSA's multidisciplinary approach to service delivery ensures interaction and communication among all clinicians thereby ensuring that all biological, psychological and social factors are examined. RSA's involvement is dictated by the needs of the individual, family or organization supporting the individual. When possible, RSA provides clinical services within the home or environment where the individual is most comfortable or where they are experiencing difficulties.

Located in Woodstock or London, Ontario, the Psychologist or Psychologist Associate will be accountable for the review, assessment, consultation and supervision of treatment interventions for individuals (adults 18 years of age or older) who have intellectual disabilities and are experiencing emotional, behavioural, or medical difficulties which are beyond the scope of their caregivers to address. She/he will be responsible for the assessment and diagnosis of cognitive functioning and mental health issues, consultation with individuals, families and agencies, and development and delivery of training and workshops. The Psychologist/Psychologist Associate will also offer consultation and supervision to other staff and non-registered psychology staff, including four psychometrists, and will be expected to work closely with other team members to plan, implement and evaluate treatment and behavioural plans for the individuals we support. With a flexible schedule, the Psychologist/Psychologist Associate will travel regularly to clients in London, Woodstock, Grey Bruce, Windsor and Chatham.

In addition to the completion of a Master's degree or Ph.D. in psychology, the ideal Psychologist/ Psychologist Associate is either registered or eligible for registration with the College of Psychologists of Ontario and has deep knowledge of the field of social and health sciences. She/he has gained extensive experience in the field of intellectual disabilities, including Dual Diagnosis, Autism and Fetal Alcohol Syndrome, with a health care, mental health or social service agency, with a strong behavioural emphasis. With experience conducting psychological, behavioural and/or mental health assessment of adults, the Psychologist will be trained in Applied Behaviour Analysis. Possessing outstanding



interpersonal, written and verbal communication skills, she/he can deal congenially with a variety of people effectively and efficiently with minimal supervision.

RSA's involvement is dictated by the needs of the individual, family or organization supporting the individual.

RSA offers a broad assortment of training and educational opportunities within the areas of intellectual disability, challenging behaviour and mental health issues.

RSA is committed to the provision of clinical services from a Bio-Psycho-Social perspective, meaning challenging behaviour is seen as a symptom of other conditions. Such conditions might be biologically or medically based (BIO), psychologically based (PSYCH) or socially or environmentally based (SOCIAL). As such, RSA's goal is to improve the person's quality of life by the identification and recognition of the conditions that create or cause unwanted behaviours. RSA is committed to services that:

This is an exciting opportunity to work with a talented and dedicated team of professionals in a collegial, collaborative, and supportive culture and to develop and/or expand your expertise in the important, rewarding, and under-served field of intellectual disabilities.

The Psychologist or Psychologist Associate is accountable for the review, assessment, consultation and supervision of treatment interventions for individuals (adults 18 years of age and older) who have developmental disabilities and are experiencing emotional, behavioural, or medical difficulties which are beyond the scope of their caregivers to address. She/he will be responsible for the assessment and diagnosis of cognitive functioning and mental health issues, consultation with individuals, families and agencies along with developing and conducting training and workshops. The Psychologist or Psychologist Associate will also offer consultation and supervision to other non-registered psychology staff and will be expected to work closely with other team members to plan, implement and evaluate treatment and behavioural plans for the individuals receiving services from RSA.

Reporting to a Clinical Supervisor and located in either Woodstock or London, the Psychologist/Psychologist Associate will serve as a coach and mentor to four psychometrists. She/he will travel regularly to clients, dividing her/his time between London, Woodstock, Grey Bruce, Windsor and Chatham.

Desirable Leadership Experience and Competencies

The ideal candidate has completed a Master's or Ph.D. degree in psychology and is either registered or eligible for registration with the College of Psychologists of Ontario. With deep knowledge in the field of social and health sciences, she/he has extensive experience in the field of developmental disabilities with a health care, mental health or social service agency, with a strong behavioural emphasis. This may include Autism or Fetal Alcohol Syndrome. She/he will have experience conducting psychological, behavioural and/or mental health assessments of adults and working and training in Applied Behaviour Analysis. She/he has the ability to plan, execute and evaluate appropriate behavioural treatment programs in collaboration with a multidisciplinary team, and knowledge of a range of psychometric tests.

She/he will possess excellent interpersonal, written and verbal communication skills, and a demonstrated ability to deal congenially with a variety of people effectively and efficiently with minimal supervision. The Psychologist/Psychologist Associate can adhere to deadlines and prioritize multiple projects, and plan and prepare presentations and training programs. Knowledgeable in a variety of computer software applications and automated record keeping, she/he has demonstrated ability in adherence to client rights, understanding client's ability to direct care, and client confidentiality. She/he has a valid Driver's License with a minimum G2 standing, and access to a reliable automobile for extensive travel throughout Southwestern Ontario.
