



**Department of Psychology  
Lecturer Position- without-term (2)**

Applications are being accepted for two full-time positions as Lecturer without-term (i.e., continued from year to year) in Psychology effective September 1, 2019 or January 1, 2020.

A Ph.D., or equivalent, in Psychology is required, and the candidate must demonstrate evidence of effectiveness in teaching from evaluations, reference letters, teaching statement, and past teaching experience. The successful applicant will be expected to teach courses at both the senior and junior levels.

A Lecturer position involves teaching as the primary responsibility entails teaching between 7 and 10 courses spread over the Fall, Winter, Spring, and/or Summer terms. Courses will be assigned to ensure 6 continuous weeks for vacation.

Successful candidates must demonstrate the ability to teach many of the following courses: Psychology 120 –Biological and Cognitive Bases; Psychology 121 – Social-Cultural, Clinical, and Developmental Psychology; statistics; research methods; qualitative research; and cognition/neuroscience-, developmental-, social-, and/or psychopathology-related courses.
